
Unit 4: American Political Ideologies and Beliefs DC TRIPS Room 2B



4.2 Explain how cultural factors influence political attitudes and socialization.

- 1. Family, schools, peers, media, social environments (including civic and religious organizations) contribute to the development of an individual's political attitudes and values through the process of political socialization.
- 2. The relative importance of major political events to the development of individual political attitudes is an example of political socialization.
- 3. Generational and lifecycle effects also contribute to the political socialization that influences an individual's political attitudes.
- 4. As a result of globalization, U.S. political culture has both influenced and been influenced by the values of other countries.

- 7. Examine the Answer Categories.
- 8. Evaluate the Results.





Essentials

Liberal ideologies favor less governmental regulation of personal privacy and more involvement in promoting social and economic equality; conservative ideologies favor more government of personal privacy and less governmental involvement to ensure social and economic equality; libertarian ideology opposes any governmental regulation of personal privacy or social/economic equality beyond the protection of individual liberties and private property.
